All staff are working hard towards their 20 hours of developmental training this year and have participated in several virtual and in person early childhood conferences. We have had many successful well attended events this year including our Christmas worship program, Donuts with grown-ups, Pre-K graduation, bike race, and Field Day. Currently applying for a few more grants this coming year and was blessed with several this past year which helped us increase our Chapel and school library.

Pastor Letter

As you read this, I am no longer serving as your pastor, having accepted a call to a new congregation in Georgia. Though my time at Christ Lutheran has come to a close, my gratitude and love for this community remain strong.

Serving as your pastor for the past six years has been one of the most meaningful chapters of my life. We've walked together through the joys and struggles of life and faith. We've worshiped, served, prayed, and grown—not just as individuals, but as a church family.

Christ Lutheran is a congregation with real strengths. You are truly a welcoming people. You make space for strangers to become friends, for seekers to find a spiritual home. Your heart for hospitality reflects the heart of Christ.

You care deeply about each other's lives. That's not something every congregation can claim. Here, people show up for one another—not out of obligation, but out of genuine love. Whether it's a word of encouragement, a meal during hard times, or simply being present, you demonstrate what it means to be the body of Christ.

You have also nurtured a beautiful, vibrant music ministry—one that uplifts worship and expresses the depth of your faith in ways words alone cannot. The care and creativity shown through your musicians and leaders has been a gift to witness.

Another hallmark of your identity is your care for families and children. You understand the importance of nurturing young people in the faith—not just through programming, but through presence, support, and inclusion. I've seen you surround young families with grace and encouragement, and that investment will continue to bear fruit for years to come.

I've said this many times before but it bears repeating. I'm very proud of the way Christ Lutheran Church stayed united through the COVID-19 pandemic. This may seem like a small bit of praise, but it's not. It's a profound testament to the culture and love within this church. Many congregations became fractured during that season—pulled apart by stress, fear, and disagreement. While we certainly had to make tough decisions—some of which not everyone agreed with—you chose to walk through it together. You extended grace. You trusted your leadership. And you prioritized the well-being of the community. That spirit of unity matters, and I thank you for the trust you placed in me and in each other during that time.

If I carry one regret from my time with you, it's that I didn't lead us further into the community. Christ Lutheran has so much to offer, and our neighbors have so many needs. I believe this church can be a powerful presence outside the walls of Sunday morning worship. So I encourage you to seek out those opportunities—to serve, to connect, and to reflect Christ's love in tangible ways throughout the week.

As a practical starting point: I strongly encourage you to take part in the Fall Festival Parade. It may seem like a small thing, but it's excellent exposure and a joyful way to show your presence in the community. Be seen. Be known. Be the Church outside the building.

When I was asked by the Governance Board to share any final words of wisdom, I offered a simple quote from my grandfather: "Leave the weeds alone." What he meant—and what I've come to value deeply—is the importance of discerning what truly matters. Not every issue demands your energy. Not every disagreement is a crisis. Be careful about where you invest your time and spirit. Trust that God is at work, even when everything isn't perfectly in order.

I am deeply proud of this church's leadership. I've seen firsthand the thoughtfulness, courage, and prayer that guide their decisions. I trust they will continue to lead with love, rooted in faith and propelled by the vision of Christ's Church—not just preserving what has been, but boldly imagining what could be.

But what's more, I am proud of each and every disciple at Christ Lutheran. Your faith, your service, your willingness to grow, and your love for one another have left a mark on me. You are the Church—not because of what happens in the building, but because of how you live your faith beyond it. Thank you for shaping me—not only as a pastor, but as a husband, son, and father. Your grace, your support, and your love have impacted every corner of my life. I am a better pastor, husband, son, and father because of my time with you.

I hope you've read this far and if so indulge but a very short homily.

One of my favorite verses in Scripture is Mark 9:24: "I believe; help my unbelief." At first glance, it might seem like a heavy or even discouraging verse to leave you with—but I don't see it that way. I find it hopeful and life-giving.

This phrase is spoken by a desperate father who brings his afflicted son to Jesus, a boy tormented since childhood by convulsions that caused him to fall, seize, and suffer. The father pleads for Jesus' help. Jesus replies, "If you can believe, all things are possible." And the man answers honestly, "I believe; help my unbelief."

What moves me so deeply is Jesus' response—not condemnation, not frustration, but healing. Despite the father's incomplete faith, Jesus still heals the boy. His compassion was not reserved for those with perfect confidence, but extended fully to one who dared to trust in the middle of his doubt.

So when you, as Christ Lutheran Church, find yourselves in moments where belief feels thin, where questions outnumber answers, think of this father's plea—and more importantly, remember Jesus' response. Jesus works in so many beautiful ways, but perhaps most beautifully, He works through our unbelief.

Friends, forge into the future with love, grace, hope, and belief. But in the moments of doubt—trust.

Christ Lutheran has a strong foundation and a bright future. Keep loving well, keep focusing on what matters (leave the weeds alone), and keep following the Spirit's lead.

President Report

When you enter a faith journey, you have a goal and idea where you hope it will end. As Christians that is heaven seated with our Savior Jesus Christ. However, you never know where the path to get there will take you. For me, this was very evident during my tenure as GB President this past year. Just before taking office, I began thinking about what we might do during the year. Two years ago, the board cleaned up and organized the Constitution to include Continuing Resolutions and streamline our organizational documents. Last year we physically de-cluttered the church to get rid of things that we no longer use. So what to do next?

From a church document standpoint, a Governance Board Policies document regarding the Preschool needed to be put in place. The goal of this is to provide high-level guidance to the Preschool as to the overarching expectations of CLCZ. Quite a few documents, some dating back to 2010, were discussed and even voted on, but there was no single document created that collected and organized all of these. Additionally, a task force was convened to discuss how the preschool should fit into the overall administration at CLCZ. It was decided that it was best to continue 'as is' being a part of the business of the church and not spun off into its own entity. So, all the pieces of the puzzle to organize the Policies document for the Preschool seem to exist and just need to be collected into a single document. This was true but proved to be pretty big task. Luckily, the board stayed with it, and we were able to complete this in March. The path had its share of 'road construction', but we made it.

Surprise! At the very same meeting, Pastor Wes informed us that he would be leaving. So, another change in direction for the path! Even though Wes has left us, I feel that we are ready to face the challenge of finding a new pastor with some apprehension, but mostly with energy and excitement for the future.

In addition to dealing with these large tasks, we also spent some time looking at the long-range planning matrix from a few years ago. Based on this, we determined that refurbishing the Fellowship Hall was the next item for our focus. And due to the generosity of our congregation during the 2023-2024 fiscal year, we have some substantial seed money we can use to get started. This discussion will continue in the coming year.

Finally, I would like to thank CLCZ members and Pastor Wes in particular for giving me the opportunity to lead this great congregation. I have learned a lot and wish all the best to Jen McKinzie and the rest of the board in the coming year.

Organization Reports

Christ Lutheran Church Preschool Board

Mission of the Ministry

The purpose of the Board is to support the preschool, director, and staff in carrying out the mission of the preschool. The Board is responsible for safeguarding the integrity of the organization and also serves in advisory and advocacy capacities. Areas of involvement include spiritual direction, programming, communication, finance, policy development and additional areas as needed or desired. The Board serves as the primary conduit of information between the director, the governing body of the Church, and members of the congregation.

Progress of the Ministry

- We have welcomed Jeff Berger as the Gov Board President representative on our Preschool Board. It has been very helpful for communication and coordination between the two boards, especially as it relates to policy development. Matt Knox also joined as secretary.
- We worked with the Governance Board most of the year and on a new Preschool Policy document approved by the Governance board for Preschool. This document provides more formal clarity on Preschool Board duties, Code of Ethics, endorsements, confidentiality, conflict resolution, record retention, Preschool board membership, roles of Pastor and Gov Bd president, staff, parent, special needs and curriculum minimum requirements and several policies related to finances and grants, communications and Facilities.
- We continued to be blessed by Grants obtained by Melissa. We appreciate our Path to Quality Level -PTQ level 3 status (safety and educational quality) that allows us to apply to the United Way, Lilly Endowment, Office of Early Childhood and Out-of-School Learning grants.
- Congregational connections are occurring. Many preschool children have attended our St. Nick event, Easter Egg hunt and VBS. We hope to continue to improve this by encouraging members to come to our Preschool worship service at Christmas and also the family day year- end event.
- Expressing gratefulness for all the support the Church and parents gave. Also, the many people who
 spread mulch and donate items and money for tuition assistance. I appreciate all board members for
 working with the Gov Board that allowed approval of preschool policy to previously was only
 approved by the Preschool Board. It is great to have a partnership in ministry that helps spread the
 good news to families in our Church and community.

How Can you Help?

Tuition Assistance Donations: We appreciate the many people who have donated to our tuition assistance fund for families in need. We have averaged needing over \$10000/yr in requests, so we pray for your continued support, so we do not need to utilize operational funds and detract from our educational spending and staff compensation. Because of PTQ level 3, on being On My Way Pre-K and CCDF providers we have helped some families also get government childcare assistance.

Substitutes and Teachers: As an ongoing request, the preschool is always in need of substitute teachers to ensure a high standard of care for children when the regular teachers are absent. In addition, periodically we are in need of additional staff. Please consider a 4 or 7 hour paid opportunity or share this need with others you know who might be interested. We also have administrative needs that are paid/or volunteer. We follow the Zionsville school schedule which is a benefit. We also pay for 20+ hours of continuing ed. Thank you!

Vision for the Ministry

- Continue to encourage Church membership and parents to support families with tuition assistance donations so that they can afford quality Christian education for their child.
- With the new Preschool policies, reformat our current Preschool board handbook to reference this new document and then review and approve internal policies with only the Preschool Board.
- Participate in a more in-depth Strategic Plan exercise with board, Church, staff and families.
- Continue refresher seminars on Faith Formation for the teaching staff
- Communicate the Preschool & Preschool Board's needs for the current Pastoral call.
- Improve Church/School engagement. Implement mentoring ministry between congregation and young families or Parenting seminars or bible studies for families with young children.
- Review additional Financial policies with the Governance Board &/or Finance team.
- Maximize utilization of grants available through 2025 and obtain additional as needed to improve our educational and outreach ministry and support an aging facility (heating/cooling).
- Increase awareness of teaching and sub positions to better support the school when staff is sick or unavailable or we are in need of new teachers.

Mission of the Ministry

Christ Lutheran Church Preschool provides a Christian atmosphere in which children can learn, play and develop with the assurance of the child's safety and well-being. We provide a faith based, high quality early childhood education to encourage children and families to know Christ and to serve His world. Our goal is to offer a safe and nurturing environment that promotes the physical, social, spiritual, emotional, and cognitive development of each child through an integrated curriculum approach.



Progress of the Ministry

This is my fourth full year as the Director of Christ Lutheran Church Preschool, and it has been one of the best years yet. My bonds with the staff and families continue to grow and we were able to spend more time together in fellowship throughout the year. Our staff changes slightly from year to year but luckily, we have a really great team in place currently to help support our ministry.

- The program remains mostly full, and families are excited to return next year.
- We lost 2 staff this year, however we are blessed to have found a great replacement.
- CLCP is talked about with the highest praise on social media and within the community by current families, past families and employees.
- During Christmas CLCP decorated and dropped off Christmas cards to Zionsville meadows, and dropped off homemade cards and treats to the Zionsville Fire Department after their visit to our school.
- Cheryl Kussow was kind enough to train all preschool staff in the beginning of the year on various aspects of Faith formation in preschoolers, giving guidance on various faith-based activities and resources.
- Summer camp is slowly filling up for the 2025 summer.
- We have successfully passed all our inspections this year and have maintained our level 3 paths to quality rating.
- 75% of our staff have a child development associate degree or higher.
- All staff have almost completed their 20 hours of developmental training already for the 2025 calendar year via virtual training and our qualified team trainers.
- Chapel continues twice a week all year in the sanctuary with lots of fun experiments, activities and Bible stories to help the children retain their lessons and form their faith.
- Successful Christmas program, Donuts with Grown Ups, Ice cream social, Pre K bike race, and looking forward to Pre-K graduation (May 21 and 22 at 11am in the sanctuary) and the end of year get together.
- We received a few small grants this year, which helped increase our chapel and school library, and helped empower our teachers in and out of the classroom. With these grants we were able to do various team building activities throughout the year, such as T-shirt making, canvas paintings, and numerous lunch outings during staff meetings.
- Applied for another small grant and am awaiting word.
- We had over 200 people attend our year end field day last year which will take place this year on May 23 from 11am-1pm, all are welcome for fun, games, fellowship, and Grace Truck brunch.

Vision for the Ministry

- Retain current staff and families in the coming years and continue the reputation we have in the community
- Continue to strengthen the relationship between the Church and the Preschool by offering more activities for the congregation and preschool to do together
- Continue to research grant opportunities to improve our program and church

MomCo 2025

Mission of the Ministry

MomCo (formerly known as MOPS) is a ministry to mothers of all stages. MOPS celebrated its 50th anniversary last year and with this came a much needed name change. MomCo is short for Mom Community. A more inclusive and less confusing name that welcomes moms of all stages of motherhood. The name change also pinpoints exactly what moms need from day to day—community. We provide a safe space for mothers to bond and form friendships, explore and deepen their faith, and also listen to speakers on various topics relating to her as a woman, a mother, a wife, and a Christian.

Progress of the Ministry

This was my first year as the Coordinator for our MomCo group. We've seen steady attendance throughout the year, and had close to 25 moms and 3-4 childcare rooms at each meeting.

- We've welcomed about 8 new moms into our group this year, and helped care for their children during our meetings as well.
- At our last meeting in May, we had 10 registrations submitted with payment already for the 2025-2026 year.
- We were able to accommodate all the children registered to attend our childcare last year, and even were able to provide a baby room when needed. We hope to continue to build our childcare roster and have a baby room available at all times. We maintained the state ratio of children vs. caregivers at each meeting.
- This year we introduced our "social membership" which 3 moms take advantage of. These are moms who cannot attend our Wednesday morning meetings but stay connected with other events that we offer. There has been a lot of interest in having this membership option again next year, as some moms have gone back to work, but want to remain in the group!
- This year we had a major focus on spiritual discussion and all but one of our speakers had a faith-based talk. In September, we kicked off the year introducing our theme of "Wild Hope." In October we welcomed Keli Reese who focused on motherhood as a ministry. In November, we had former news anchor Brooke Martin who is a local author now, discussing her book Controlled Burn. In December we had a group favorite—our Christmas Party and gift exchange. Shan Wright kicked off the new year in January talking about having hope, less stress and more time. February brought us Kirra Sutton, the owner of Hattie's Coffee House. She discussed the hope and trust she's had in God in her recent years. As always, Cheryl Kussow brought a faith-driven meaningful and interactive discussion in March where she focussed on faith formation concepts for our children, paired with a wonderful Easter craft to take home to our families. In April, Dr. Amy Robinson shared her knowledge of Pelvic Floor health. We will close the year with introducing the new name/theme, pre-registering moms, and preparing for summer.
- Comments and notes from our end of year survey submitted at our last meeting:

 - "I love how the talks were more faith-based and felt uplifting and practical to life"

- Strengthen our bond with the church community by offering MNO activities, playdates, and coming next year, we have thought about having two evening MomCo Meetings (with dinner)!
- Continue to offer quality and relevant speakers and meeting topics for our moms, and pulling from ideas from the survey
- Continue to offer quality childcare for our KidsCo and provide them with fun and engaging spiritual lessons.

Governance Team Reports

Ministry Team Name: Columbarium

Mission of the Ministry

It is our mission to continue to provide members and their families an opportunity to choose the church, which has been central to their lives as a final resting place. Our Columbarium, located on the southeast side of our church, is a sacred space, always available for meditation.

Progress of the Ministry

In January 2025, we had a fund balance of \$15,725. which includes a generous Endowment grant of \$2,000. Thus, making it possible in February 2025 to order a second Columbarium, as our current one is completely allocated. The total projected cost including shipping, assembly, installation, and masonry is \$14,856. Additionally, we have chosen a Landscape company to do necessary work to enhance the gardens and ensure it continues to be a place of beauty and dignity. In order to accomplish this, we are investigating ways to raise \$3,500 as our January funds are scheduled to pay the 2nd Columbarium projected costs.

Metrics Highlighting Achievements

We are pleased that so many members, by reserving a niche, have chosen to return to church tradition which gives recognition to their faith life. We will have 24 additional niches available with the second Columbarium.



Vision for the Ministry

Our goal is to continue to provide an economically sound, environmentally friendly, sacred space for preplanning to allow true comfort for the family at a most difficult time.

We would welcome having a couple more members who might like to learn more about our process and potentially be a committee member later.

Mission of the Ministry

The 7 members of the Team met twice during the fiscal year.

Progress of the Ministry

There were 2 grants awarded during the year (November, 2024 & February, 2025), each for \$2000 to the Columbarium Team to help fund an additional columbarium.

The Team agreed upon a form to be used for all grant applications and another form to be used by grantees to use as a follow-up means of assessing the project and how the funds were used.

Metrics Highlighting Achievements

New Contributions: \$9,145. Total contributions to date: \$69,646 (The represents the Principle which cannot be invaded in perpetuity.)

The Balance on January 1, 2025 was \$128, 409. 4% of this amount is available for grants during the calendar year of 2025, of which \$2000 has already been granted. Remaining amount available for grants for the duration of 2025 is \$3,136

The Portfolio Balance as of this writing is \$132,850. It was \$102,957 at the end of the 23-24 fiscal year. Thus, in addition to contributions, the Balance grew \$20,748

Progress of the Ministry

 Our ministry continues to thrive with dedicated volunteers and support from our congregation. We have added some new elements to our Sunday education program including engaging the children in musical worship with Amy Foley. While we don't currently have an active middle school or high school program due



to few youth in these age groups, we involved them in events and activities such as Vacation Bible School (VBS), Breakfast with St. Nick, and the Easter Egg Hunt, and they engaged with the congregation by handing out Advent and Lenten faith resources, flowers for moms and caregivers, and popcorn. We have also partnered with the Service Network to engage kids in service projects and events including the food packing event in March. In addition to serving our church families, these activities include a significant outreach and evangelism component so that we can share God's love with families outside of our church.

Achievements of the Ministry

It is an honor and a joy to report to you on the Music Ministries of Christ Lutheran Church. The Sanctuary Choir has grown from 22 members to 24 members. Our choir season kicked off with a retreat at Hoosier Village Clubhouse on August 24th, where we spent the day singing a lot of new music, playing music games and enjoying fellowship together with a Hawaiian theme.

Celebration Bells is at capacity with 13 ringers. 
